Dear friends,

In this week's parable of the wheat and darnel, we learn that all of us are a mixture of good and bad. The people we call **good** may have terrible things in them – mad moods of recklessness, aggression, jealousy and sin. And so-called **bad** people may have in them moments of goodness, compassion, gentleness and kindness.

So, what do we do? As for ourselves, I think we must always take a good look at our own paddock, first. If we find some darnel there – as no doubt we will – we strive to rid ourselves of it. And when we do, we discover just how painful this can be.

As far as others are concerned, we respond to them as Jesus responded. It is something of a paradox that Jesus – who had no trace of evil in him – is so understanding towards those of us who seem to be riddled with the darnel of evil. Why didn't he weed out Judas? Or even Peter who was to deny him? He saw the weeds in Peter's life, certainly, but he saw the wheat growing there too. Jesus knew that with encouragement, the wheat could and would prevail. As indeed it did.

As a Church, we are called to the same response. We have to be big enough and loving enough to hold sinners in our paddock. If we do not, we are not the authentic Church of the Risen Christ.

It seems so sensible to try to root out the weeds, and indeed this has often been tried. Many governments have tried it in the face of opposition. Our daily news bulletins are full of stories of the so-called *good* trying to eliminate the so-called *bad*. Never a Christian solution. Never a humane solution.

A Church which admitted only saints would make about as much sense as a hospital which only admitted healthy people, or a smash-repair shop which only wanted brand new cars to work on. The Church is not a museum of saints: it is a school for sinners. As Pope Francis has so often reminded us, the Church is called to be like a field hospital on a battle field. There to bind up the wounds of the broken. Indeed, the Church is a temple with a hundred gates, and pilgrims – saints and sinners alike – enter through every single one of these gates. Through every door, from every direction, from all different kinds of paths, we come to the altar of God on Sunday. Ours should never be a Church for those who feel good, but for those who know they are not.

At the end of today's parable, Jesus challenges his hearers: *Listen, anyone who has ears!* We, too, hear this parable. The challenge is placed before us. Now is the time for our hearts to be converted. Now is the time for us to be changed.

Australian Catholic Bishops Conference— Voice to Parliament

As a vote on an Indigenous Voice to Parliament nears, Australia's bishops have encouraged Catholics to read and discuss the Uluru Statement from the Heart—the document from which the Voice proposal emerged.

During their recent plenary meeting in Sydney, the bishops considered how they might assist Catholics in preparing for the referendum to enshrine the Voice to Parliament in the Constitution, with a vote due in the second half of 2023.

The bishops argued that the fact First Nations Peoples have lived in Australia for many thousands of years but their custodianship of the land isn't mentioned in the Constitution: "It is an omission which needs to be rectified...a Voice to Parliament isn't the only way to achieve that outcome, but it is the way requested by those who gathered at the historic meeting at Uluru...This could be a significant step towards a more just and equitable Australia...we want to encourage all Australians to educate themselves as well as possible concerning the proposal to establish the Voice.

The bishops call for a meaningful debate on the issue, acknowledging that 'people may, in good faith, have differing concerns and perspectives...we are an open democracy, and this is a moment to use our democratic institutions to produce a highquality debate shaped by a genuine concern to do justice and bring healing to First Nations Peoples...we ask those drafting the changes to the Constitution to work together in a spirit of cooperation, so that the proposal presented to the Australian people will appeal to a wide range of the population.'

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference endorsed the Uluru Statement from the Heart in 2021, with the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia taking the same step last year. The bishops have encouraged us to read the document and have discussions about our response to its key messages.

Gospel: Matthew 13:24-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Let them grow together until the harvest.

Jesus put a parable before the crowds, 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everybody was asleep his enemy came, sowed darnel all among the wheat, and made off. When the new wheat sprouted and ripened, the darnel appeared as well. The owner's servants went to him and said, "Sir, was it not good seed that you sowed in your field? If so, where does the darnel come from?" "Some enemy has done this" he answered. And the servants said, "Do you want us to go and weed it out?" But he said, "No, because when you weed out the darnel you might pull up the wheat with it. Let them both grow till the harvest; and at harvest time I shall say to the reapers: First collect the darnel and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barn.""

He put another parable before them, 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field. It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the biggest shrub of all and becomes a tree so that the birds of the air come and shelter in its branches.'

He told them another parable, 'The kingdom of heaven is like the yeast a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour till it was leavened all through.'

In all this Jesus spoke to the crowds in parables; indeed he would never speak to them except in parables. This was to fulfil the prophecy:

I will speak to you in parables and expound things hidden since the foundation of the world.

Then, leaving the crowds, he went to the house; and his disciples came to him and said, 'Explain the parable about the darnel in the field to us.' He said in reply, 'The sower of the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world; the good seed is the subjects of the kingdom; the darnel, the subjects of the evil one; the enemy who sowed them, the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; the reapers are the angels. Well then, just as the darnel is gathered up and burnt in the fire, so it will be at the end of time. The Son of Man will send his angels and they will gather out of his kingdom all things that provoke offences and all who do evil, and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth. Then the virtuous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Listen, anyone who has ears!'
