Dear friends.

In this Sunday's First Reading we hear how the people of Israel were expected to treat the stranger: You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. The Israelites had themselves been poor and strangers. Just as God had taken pity on them, so they, too, were they to take pity on outsiders. And so, they were commanded: If a stranger lives with you in your land, do not molest him. You must count him as one of your own countrymen and love him as yourself – for you were strangers in the land of Egypt. I am the Lord your God.

The Israelites were commanded to *love the strangers as they loved themselves*. The reason for this was no further than their own experience. They were to look into their own heart and remember the time when they were the outsiders, remember the time when they were out of their element. Loving the stranger was something that had to be done because that was what God did: *It is* God *who sees justice done for the widow and the orphan, who loves the stranger and gives him food and clothing.*Love the stranger then, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt.

And then, the stranger ceased feeling like a stranger when they were offered hospitality. It is no surprise then that *hospitality* came to be regarded as one of the primary virtues. Especially for a nomadic people like the Israelites, hospitality could be a matter of life and death: travellers depended for their survival on the hospitality of strangers. The stranger, the wayfarer, the outsider – anyone outside their own country or their natural space – was regarded as someone deserving special care.

In the Gospel Jesus speaks of the conquering power of love when he says to his followers, *You must love your neighbour as yourself*. As the Israelites were asked to love the stranger as themselves, so Christians are asked to love their neighbours. The ultimate offer of hospitality is the offer of love. Often the real stranger in our midst is not the person we don't know but the person we don't *want to* know, the person we refuse to love. That person might be a neighbour or even a member of our own family or the person sitting in the pew next to us. We all have strangers in our own midst, still waiting to be welcomed and loved.

We are often scared to take people in because we are afraid of being taken in ourselves. We don't want to be conned or taken for a ride. Hospitality, like everything else, has a price. Jesus knew that when he opened up his heart to receive people. People make demands on you; they can bleed you. But remaining secure behind our locked doors has its own penalty: people die from being unvisited, people die behind locked doors and locked hearts, from caring only for themselves. We all need the strangers and neighbours in our midst to test the quality of our mercy. When we respond, we have the assurance that we minister to Christ who says to us: *I was a stranger and you welcomed me*. Christ still comes to us. Not only in the form of bread and wine, but also in the form of the stranger seeking welcome. That is Gospel.



First Reading: Exodus 22:20-26

A reading from the book of Exodus

If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

"If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

"If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me, I will listen, for I am full of pity."

We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.
