Dear friends,

Tuesday - Friday:

We don't ever hear much from the prophet Malachi, from whom this Sunday's First Reading is taken. It's a short book – only 55 verses. And in our cycle of readings, we only ever hear about 18 verses. It was written about 450 years before Jesus. And it wasn't written by a bloke named Malachi, either. The word *Malachi* simply means *messenger*. And he was a pretty harsh messenger at times, too. In today's First Reading, the author is attacking the priests of the Temple in Jerusalem. They had strayed from the way; they had caused many to stumble by their teaching. They had not helped the people to remain faithful to the Covenant with the Lord. These priests had not been faithful to this tradition of handing on the Law from one generation to the next.

The Pharisees were the inheritors of this tradition of passing on the Law. Their love for the Word of God was so great that they would write down small verses from Scripture, place the piece of parchment in a small box, and tie the box onto their heads. These are the phylacteries which Jesus is talking about in today's Gospel. And while it does sound strange to us, the idea behind these phylacteries – to keep the Word of God forever before their minds – is a quite good one.

I suppose it was because there was such a good idea behind the phylacteries that Jesus criticised the Pharisees. They had missed the point. By the time of Jesus, some elements in this great Jewish tradition of handing on the Law of Moses had come to concentrate more on the outward observances, rather than on the reason behind them. The people who are criticised by Jesus in today's Gospel, had come to concentrate more on having a phylactery tied to their forehead with long tassels. They had forgotten the original idea of keeping the Word of God constantly before their mind.

Perhaps this was the sort of thing which St Paul was talking about in the Second Reading. He was praising the Church of Thessalonika because they had received the Good News about Jesus as the message of God. They had not confused this message or replaced this message with some human thinking.

Much the same idea is behind the saying of Jesus at the end of today's Gospel: *The greatest among you must be your servant.* It is easy to believe that greatness is about being exalted; about having others serve you.

If we believe that this is what greatness is all about in the Kingdom, then we have missed the point. If we believe that this is what the Kingdom is all about, then we have replaced the Good News with some human thinking. Jesus shows us another way. Over the weeks and months that we have heard Jesus preaching the Kingdom of God, Jesus has shown us that there truly is another way. Jesus has shown us that the values of the Kingdom really are different. True greatness is about serving others. And our model for this is Jesus, and the giving of his life on the Cross. May our greatness lie in this sort of service.




The Sign: Advent & Christmas **Daily** Reflections 2023



You must call no one on earth your father, since you have only one Father, and he is in heaven. Nor must you allow yourselves to be called teachers, for you have only one Teacher, the Christ. The greatest among you must be your servant. Anyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and anyone who humbles himself will be exalted.'
