### Dear friends,

Challenging to our modern ears is this Sunday's *First Reading* from the Book of Proverbs. Indeed, most of the Book of Proverbs sounds strange to us. It is a collection of 915 maxims or proverbs which follow one another without any logical order. Perhaps this explains why we read so little of it in the Sunday Lectionary: only 44 verses. But many people would argue that today's reading is beyond the pale.

For this reading praises *a perfect wife*. And the value that she is to her husband: *she is far beyond the price of pearls*. This perfect wife sits at her spinning wheel and weaves fabric and cares for the poor. While it is a noble picture, many modern people would argue that the picture that is painted of womanhood and of married life is out-dated and not helpful for the genuine promotion of female dignity.

That is certainly one way to interpret this reading. But I suggest, that it is not the *right* way to interpret this reading. The perfect wife is praised because she accomplishes her work to perfection. She could have been a teacher, an accountant, or a lion-tamer. *What* she does is not the issue. What is the issue is that what she does, she does *well*. She is faithful to God's law. She is a faithful servant of the Lord. And this, ultimately, is what true holiness is all about. Here is a woman presented as the model for those who wish to be faithful to God because she diligently fulfils the daily tasks entrusted to her, however humble they may be. She stands as a model *for us* because her example teaches us that we must not seek perfection elsewhere than in faithfulness to everyday duties.

I suspect that we must read this parable in the context of our reading of Matthew's Gospel which has now taken place for almost twelve months. And by now, we should know that one of the principle themes – if not *the* – principal theme of Matthew's Gospel is the proclamation of the Kingdom of God. In word and action, Jesus has taught us what this Kingdom of God is really like. It goes against the so-called wisdom of this world: it is salt and light for all who seek to live by it.

And now, having heard this Kingdom proclaimed, the ball is in our court. We stand now in the place of the servants who were given these talents. Our Master – the Risen Lord – has gone from our midst. Ascended into heaven. And so, through our Baptism and Confirmation, we have been entrusted with the task of looking after the Master's affairs in this world. And it is time for us to make a profit with what we have been given.

Whether we have been given five talents, or two talents, or only one talent in the Kingdom, *we know by now* what the Kingdom is all about. We cannot claim that we do not know. And so, we are called to make a profit. We are called to make the Kingdom of God just a little bit more present in our world. And like the perfect wife, it may simply be through faithfulness and diligence in our daily tasks. Few of us are ever called to change the whole world on our own. But all of us are called to change our own hearts and minds, so that we might better change the world in which we live. We have heard the Kingdom proclaimed. We know that we are called to *bear much fruit* in the Kingdom. To fail in this, is to be thrown out *into the dark…where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth.* We can't say that we never knew.

We respectfully acknowledge the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin nation, as the traditional caretakers of the land which is the St. Monica's Catholic Parish. We acknowledge the Elders, past & present. May we, too, be good stewards of this land.

#### Give her a share in what she has worked for.

A perfect wife - who can find her? She is far beyond the price of pearls. Her husband's heart has confidence in her, from her he will derive no little profit. Advantage and not hurt she brings him all the days of her life. She is always busy with wool and with flax, she does her work with eager hands. She sets her hands to the distaff, her fingers grasp the spindle. She holds out her hand to the poor, she opens her arms to the needy. Charm is deceitful, and beauty empty; the woman who is wise is the one to praise. Give her a share in what her hands have worked for, and let her works tell her praises at the city gates.

You will not be expecting us to write anything to you, brothers, about 'times and seasons,' since you know very well that the Day of the Lord is going to come like a thief in the night. It is when people are saying, 'How quiet and peaceful it is,' that the worst suddenly happens, as suddenly as labour pains come on a pregnant woman; and there will be no way for anybody to evade it.

But it is not as if you live in the dark, my brothers, for that Day to overtake you like a thief. No, you are all sons of light and sons of the day: we do not belong to the night or to darkness, so we should not go on sleeping, as everyone else does, but stay wide awake and sober.

#### Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

# Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir," he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him. "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things. I will trust you with greater: come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was afraid, and I went off and hid your talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-fornothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."
