Dear friends.

Another Sunday of Easter; another resurrection story...The resurrection of Jesus from the dead is the crowning truth of our Christian faith. But, the empty tomb *in itself* is not a direct proof of the resurrection. Nevertheless, it was the first step towards establishing *the* truth that Jesus had escaped the bonds of death. This empty tomb also prepared the disciples to encounter the Risen Lord.

The shock caused by the death of Jesus was such that the disciples were slow to believe in the news of the Resurrection. We saw that last week with Thomas; we see it this week with the other disciples. When the risen Lord stands among them, they are in a state of *alarm and fright*. So much so, that Jesus greets them with peace. But even when faced with the reality of the risen Jesus, they still doubted, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. And knowing this state of alarm and fright, Jesus eats before them to dispel their thoughts of him being a ghost.

As Christians, it is crucial for us to affirm the bodily resurrection of Jesus. This is very different from the belief of some other faiths that the human spirit is somehow eternal and continues after the death of the body: that the body dies and the spirit is released into a new life. Nowhere does Sacred Scripture teach this. Our Christian belief is that the body *will* share in the triumph of the resurrection. The resurrection stories which we listen to during this Easter season keep stressing that Jesus rose *with* his body: the tomb is empty, the apostles touch him, he eats with them and walks with them.

All these stories stress that the Risen Jesus is the same as the Crucified Jesus.

Yet, he is somehow changed, and that is why his friends do not immediately recognise him. And so, the Resurrection from the dead is not simply a return to earthly life as before. Jesus has risen to a *new* life; and life *beyond* death; a life *with God*. He is the same, yet he is transformed.

And so for us? The bodily resurrection of Jesus is the most profound basis for the Christian attitude towards the human body. Our human bodies are not vile engines of evil and sin. Rather they are an essential part of what it means to be human. A humanity shared by Jesus. And these bodies of ours are destined to be risen on the last day. And so, we take care of the bodies of the hungry, the sick and elderly because we know that these bodies are destined to share in the resurrection of Jesus.

This is the echo of our *Alleluia* to which we are witnesses. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead invites all of us not so much to become something else, but to be more authentically who and what we already are.

First Reading: Acts 3:13-15, 17-19

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

You have killed the prince of life; God, however, raised him from the dead.

Peter said to the people 'You are Israelites, and it is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the God of our ancestors, who has glorified his servant Jesus, the same Jesus you handed over and then disowned in the presence of Pilate, after Pilate had decided to release him. It was you who accused the Holy One, the Just One, you who demanded the reprieve of a murderer while you killed the prince of life. God, however, raised him from the dead, and to that fact we are the witnesses.

'Now I know, brothers, that neither you nor your leaders had any idea what you were really doing; this was the way God carried out what he had foretold, when he said through all his prophets that his Christ would suffer. Now you must repent and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out.'

The disciples told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised Jesus at the breaking of bread.

They were still talking about this when Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you!' In a state of alarm and fright, they thought they were seeing a ghost. But he said, 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts? Look at my hands and feet; yes, it is I indeed. Touch me and see for yourselves; a ghost has no flesh and bones as you can see I have.' And as he said this he showed them his hands and feet. Their joy was so great that they could not believe it, and they stood dumbfounded; so he said to them, 'Have you anything here to eat?' And they offered him a piece of grilled fish, which he took and ate before their eyes.

Then he told them, 'This is what I meant when I said, while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses, in the Prophets and in the Psalms, has to be fulfilled.' He then opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, 'So you see how it is written that the Christ would suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that, in his name, repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses to this.'
