

My role in the Parish Office

St Monica's Charismatic Prayer Group

The Charismatic Prayer Group meets every Thursday at 7.45pm in the Symons Centre. The Group gathers to give praise, thanks, honour and to bestow love upon Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour.

The Charismatic Prayer Group was founded in 1986 with Fr (later Bishop) Joe Grech and assistant priest to Fr Lanigan. We

have an average attendance of about 25 to 30 people.

Men's Breakfast

We initiated a free Men's Breakfast in October 2016 which featured guest speaker Vic Camilleri of Vic's Flicks, who spoke about his passion for showing classic films to the older generation. Ginger Rogers & Fred Astaire featured in a film sequence. Our second breakfast on 25 February featured retired Chief Inspector of Police Lawrie Merrigan. Lawrie told how Providence led him into the police, and he shared experiences, such as his leadership initiative "police on bikes "in the city. A talented singer, Lawrie moved us with his rendition of songs "One Day at a Time" and "My Old Man".

The free Men's Breakfast's will continue in 2017 to inform, entertain and inspire men in their Christian vocation.



St Monica's Prayer Group, as part of the worldwide Charismatic Renewal, is celebrating its 50 Year Jubilee. The beginnings of the renewal stem from a retreat of professors and students in Pittsburgh, USA. In preparation for this retreat they prayed for a special outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and studied the beginnings of the early Church in the Acts of the Apostles. They experienced the Holy Spirit in a way similar to the Pentecost experience of the Apostles together with Mary in the upper room. To celebrate this significant anniversary the Melbourne Renewal has made a large cross which will come to St Monica's Church on Saturday 1 April, 2017. Special prayers and devotions will take place in St Monica's Church and surrounding parishes in the week following. Watch this space.

DVD Presentations

The prayer group will host a series of DVD talks on the theme "Knowing God Better.". The series will be screened in the Symons Centre on seven evenings from 7.30 pm, commencing on Thursday 4 May, 2017. The sessions will include songs of praise, DVD talk, group discussion and prayer. Themes include: Knowing God's Love, Forgiveness, Help, Word, Spirit and Hope. We would love to see parishioners take advantage of this series of encouraging sessions.

Monthly Family Healing Prayer

Every first Sunday of the month after 10.30 am Mass, prayer group members are available to pray for spiritual, family and physical healing. We have experienced instances of God blessing us with answers to our prayers, such as John the truck driver who was healed of his back problems. All are welcome to take advantage of these prayers for healing.




St Monica's Youth Mass

ST PATRICK'S OFL

Saint Profile: St Patrick

St. Patrick of Ireland is one of the world's most popular saints. Born in Roman Britain in 387, Patrick was a humble, pious, gentle man, whose love and total devotion to and trust in God should be a shining example to each of us.

After spending many years as a slave in Ireland, young Patrick returned to his family in Britain. Thereafter he had a vision of a man called Victoricus, who gave him a letter entitled: 'The Voice of the Irish'. Patrick heard the collective voice of the Irish people plead: 'We appeal to you, holy servant boy, to come and walk among us.'"

Patrick was later ordained a bishop, arriving in Slane, Ireland on March 25, 433. Ireland was a pagan country and one famous legend describes when he met the chieftain of one of the druid tribes, who tried to kill him. Saved from death by God, Patrick converted the chieftain and preached the Gospel throughout Ireland.

Famously Patrick used shamrocks to explain the Holy Trinity and entire kingdoms were eventually converted to Christianity after hearing Patrick's message.

Patrick preached and converted all of Ireland for 40 years. He worked many miracles and wrote of his love for God

in Confessions. After years of living in poverty, travelling and enduring much suffering he died March 17, 461.

He died at Saul, where he had built the first Irish church. He is believed to rest in Down Cathedral, Downpatrick. In 1990 a granite stone was placed at his grave.

Patrick's poem of faith and trust in God:

"Christ be within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ inquired, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger."







Child Safety Code of Conduct St. Monica's Parish Moonee Ponds

Safeguarding Children and Young People 28/9/2016

Central to the mission of St. Monica's Parish Moonee Ponds is an unequivocal commitment to fostering the dignity, self-esteem and integrity of children and young people and providing them with a safe, supportive and enriching environment to develop spiritually, physically, intellectually, emotionally and socially.

Purpose

This Code of Conduct has a specific focus on safeguarding children and young people at St. Monica's Moonee Ponds against sexual, physical, psychological and emotional abuse or neglect. It is intended to complement child protection legislation and the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne's "Code of Conduct for Caring for Children, May our children flourish".

All staff, volunteers, contractors, clergy and parish council members at St. Monica's are expected to actively contribute to a parish culture that respects the dignity of its members and affirms the Gospel values of love, care for others, compassion and justice. They are required to observe child-safe principles and expectations for appropriate behaviour towards and in the company of children, as noted below.

Acceptable behaviours

All staff, volunteers, contractors, clergy and parish council members are responsible for supporting the safety of children by:

- adhering to the parish Child Safe Policy and upholding the parish's Statement of Commitment to child safety at all times
- taking all reasonable steps to protect children from abuse and harm
- treating everyone in the parish community with respect (modelling positive and respectful relationships and acting in a manner that sustains a safe pastoral environment)
- listening and responding to the views and concerns of children, particularly if they are telling you that they or another child have been abused or that they are worried about their safety/the safety of another child
- promoting the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children (for example, by never questioning an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander child's self-identification)
- promoting the cultural safety, participation and empowerment of children with culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds (for example, by having a zero tolerance policy towards discrimination)
- promoting the safety, participation and empowerment of children with a disability (for example, by ensuring reasonable care is taken to cater for any additional needs being faced)
- ensuring as far as practicable that an adult is not alone with a child
- reporting any allegations of child abuse to the police
- understanding and complying with all reporting obligations as they relate to mandatory reporting and reporting under the Crimes Act 1958 (Vic.)
- reporting any child safety concerns to the parish priest or the Vicar General if the concern relates to the parish priest (or Parish child safety officer Sonya Bading)




Unacceptable behaviours

Staff, volunteers, contractors, clergy and parish council members must not:


- ignore or disregard any suspected or disclosed child abuse
- develop any 'special' relationships with children that could be seen as favouritism (for example, the offering of gifts or special treatment for specific children)
- exhibit behaviours with children which may be construed as unnecessarily physical (for example, inappropriate sitting on laps)
- put children at risk of abuse (for example, by locking doors or being alone with a child with no good cause)
- initiate unnecessary physical contact with children or do things of a personal nature that a child can do for themselves, such as toileting or changing clothes
- manage disruptive or unsafe behaviour by degrading or isolating a child; corporal punishment is never acceptable. Physical restraint should only be used as a last resort or in an emergency
- engage in open discussions of a mature or adult nature in the presence of children (for example, personal details or social activities)
- use inappropriate language in the presence of children
- express personal views on cultures, race or sexuality in the presence of children
- discriminate against any child because of age, gender, race, culture, vulnerability, sexuality, ethnicity or disability
- have contact with a child or their family who is/are not socially related outside of the pastoral duties reasonably associated with the role description of the person's position in the parish without the parish priest's or child safety officer's (if the parish has appointed someone to this role) knowledge and/or consent (other than accidental contact, such as seeing people in the street)
- have any online contact (including by social media, email, instant messaging etc.) with a child or their family who is/are not family or socially related (unless necessary e.g. by providing families with e-newsletters)
- use any personal communication channels/device such as a personal email account to conduct parish communications
- exchange personal contact details such as phone number, social networking sites or email addresses with a child or their family who is/are not family or socially related
- photograph or video a child without the consent of the parent or guardians
- work with children while under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs
- consume drugs on parish premises or at parish events.

Catholic Education Week 2017

This year's Catholic Education Week took place between 12–19 March as Catholic schools celebrated more than 150 years of service to the Victorian community.



The theme - "Moved by the love of Christ," was drawn from a phrase in St Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians where he spoke of the love of Christ that urges, compels and moves us to share in Christ's ministry of reconciliation (2 Cor 5: 14).

St Monica's Primary School took part in the special Mass for schools at St Patrick's Cathedral on March 17 celebrated by Archbishop Hart. The school was well-represented by Principal Peter Moore, Vice Principal Michael Di Nuzzo, school captains, vice captains and social justice captains.

St Patrick's was filled with thousands of Catholic students, teachers and dignitaries including the Premier of Victoria Daniel Andrews and the Ambassador of Ireland Mr Breandán Ó Caollaí. The uplifting music was provided by choirs and musicians from De La Salle College, Malvern; St Mary's School, Williamstown; Xavier College, Kew; and Our Lady of Sion College, Box Hill.

After Mass, around 2,000 primary school students gathered in Treasury Gardens for the Concert in the Park to enjoy the best school bands, including performers from Padua College, Mornington; and Mercy College, Coburg.

Other highlights of the week included the Visual Arts Display at the Catholic Leadership Centre, East Melbourne, a long -established highlight of the arts education calendar, and the Young Speakers Colloquium, an opportunity for secondary students to hear about the diverse and unique life journeys former Catholic students have embarked on.



Food Coloured Dyed Easter Eggs

Materials:

- hard boiled egg(s)
- vinegar (plain white)
- small bowls, cups or empty margarine containers
- water
- food colour drops

Instructions:

Fill containers about 1/2 to 2/3 full of water. Don't have too much water or when you put the eggs in it will overflow.

Add 1 tsp of vinegar for every cup of water and add drops of food coloring.

Put hard boiled eggs in the cups.

Let the eggs dry and wipe with vegetable oil (with paper towel) to make a glossier egg.
